## A resilient San Francisco

Today marks the 114<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 1906 earthquake. At 5:12 AM, the great earthquake sent tremors throughout the Bay Area. Shaking lasted up to a minute and the quake was felt from Oregon to Nevada to Los Angeles.

In San Francisco, we know the importance of being prepared for the unexpected, taking care of our community, and when it's safe, coming together to rebuild. Recognizing the anniversary of the 1906 earthquake while we shelter in place during a global pandemic underscores the importance of being prepared and ensuring our communities are resilient to whatever emergency or disaster we must overcome together. The Waterfront Resilience Program stands with San Franciscans and the Bay Area as we all summon the courage to make our way through this crisis.

The Port's Multi-Hazard Risk Assessment, or MHRA, provides a comprehensive understanding of existing earthquake and flood risks along the Embarcadero waterfront.

Findings from the MHRA are key to understanding which areas of San Francisco's Embarcadero waterfront are most at risk, the likely consequences, and what areas the Port needs to focus on first. By understanding the potential consequences of earthquakes and flooding, Port staff, policymakers, and the public will be able to make better decisions for the future of our waterfront.



The Port is collaborating with community partners to co-host a series of online events to discuss and solicit feedback on Waterfront Resilience Program actions. Feedback will be incorporated into

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

This year's first King Tides rolled in on November 15 and 16, with the next King Tides expected December 13 through 15.


