Gardener (3417)	7	Scheduled to start on 4/29/23 (slight delay due to pre-employment medical exams from DPH). An additional position has been proposed in the FY23-24 budget; this would result in a total of 8 FTE.	
Custodian (2708)		Started on 4/15.	
Park Section Supervisor (3422)	1	The vacancy has been awarded to Brandon Young via internal reassignment process.	
Custodial Assistant Supervisor (2716)		Candidate has been selected.	



Position	FTE	Proposal
Park Rangers (8208)	2	2 FTE for staffing proposed based on analysis of parks of a similar size. Ranger security is a security is a 24/7 operation.
Park Service Area Manager (0922)	0.5	Interim Manager, Carol Sionkowski, is leading our planning effort to assume maintenance responsibility on July 1. Organizationally, RPD will create a new (7th) Park Service Area which will include Mission Bay parks and a new Park Service Area Manager. This will most likely occur in FY24-25.



Park Ranger Model and Park Hours



- Ranger Unit is 62 FTE: 48 Rangers, 7 Sergeants, 1 Chief, 1 Deputy Chief, and 5 Dispatchers
- 24/7 operation with three round-the-clock shifts that patrol parkland throughout the City.
- Mission is to be a uniformed presence to support positive park use, deter negative park use, and enforce the Park Code if deterrence fails.
- RPD plans to have a Ranger on patrol in Mission Bay on a fairly continuous basis. Ranger presence and response can be rapidly increased via calls to Ranger Dispatch.



Parks will remain with the same operating hours. (6AM to 10PM)

Park Maintenance Standards and Accountability

City Charter: CON and RPD are required to establish objective and measurable park maintenance standards.

- Quarterly: CON and RPD staff conduct park evaluations to measure compliance to the standard.
- Annually: CON analyzes and aggregates the results as part of its public reporting.





Citywide Average Score

- The citywide average park maintenance score is calculated as the mean of each fiscal year's annual park scores.
- The citywide average score was 91% in FY22, meeting its annual performance goal.
- Since FY15, the citywide score has increased by an average of 0.8 percentage points annually.
